ML582: GLOBAL LEADERSHIP IN CONTEXT (4 units). Ryan Bolger, Assistant Professor of Church in Contemporary Culture

# **DESCRIPTION:**

This one-week intensive seminar primarily serves as an orientation to Fuller Seminary and School of World Mission, the campus, and fellow cohort members. Secondarily, leaders from around the globe will be joining participating SWM faculty in dialog around the topics of leadership, mission, and to a lesser extent, global culture. Through a combination of discussions, lectures, small groups, and community meals, the present challenges to Christian leaders of the global dynamics of the twenty-first century will be discussed. Not only will this course foster an appreciation for the complexity of leadership in global culture, but it will include an emphasis on issues of injustice and the poor (primarily through the writing project).

# **LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

- Strengthen each student's biblical/theological/missiological foundations for understanding Christian leaders and their role in the world
- Understand the complexities of ministry or mission in this increasingly multi-cultural and post modern world
- Come to terms with the Great Commission as a commission not only to evangelize but also to disciple and to care
  for the poor and those who have been victims of injustice
- Foster face-to-face interaction and a deepening sense of community and connectedness among the cohort

# **COURSE FORMAT:**

This is a one-week intensive that forms part of the Global Leadership Seminar 1, a required two-week intensive course for the MA in Global Leadership. This class will meet for the first week of the seminar, 8am – 4pm, Monday through Friday. Students should read any two required books and write two proactive book reports prior to arrival for the seminar. Classes are designed to facilitate student learning through discussion, clarifying lectures, opportunities to teach, group-building exercises, and collaboration on research. Students should expect to read final four texts and complete the remainder of the assignments in their ministry context after their return home.
