ML582: CHARACTER, COMMUNITY, AND LEADERSHIP (4 units) Robert Freeman, Assistant Professor of Continuing & Distance Education Ryan Bolger, Assistant Professor of Church in Contemporary Culture

DESCRIPTION:

This one-week intensive course serves primarily as a campus orientation to Fuller Seminary resources, the MAGL program, and cohort members. Students from around the globe will join faculty in dialogue around topics of character formation. Through reading, discussions, lectures, small group exercises, experimentation with electronic community building tools, community meals, tours of the campus, and silent reflection, the challenge of developing character as a foundation for leadership will be applied to student's lives.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

During this course students will

- Prepare for continuing studies at Fuller through an orientation to campus resources
- Celebrate further development of the cohort learning community with fellow students
- Experiment with blogs (web logs) and design eportfolios as tools for communities of practice
- Analyze one model of character formation
- Examine several character formation issues of leaders
- Explore global leadership trends in emerging churches
- Apply learning by participating in an online discussion about personal character development and writing a monthly journal entry during the 10 week quarter
- Revise MAGL learning plans through conversations with advisors and peers

COURSE FORMAT:

This is a one-week intensive that forms part of the Global Leadership Seminar 1, a required two-week intensive course for the MA in Global Leadership. This class will meet for the first week of the seminar, 8a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and will continue online. Students should expect to do pre- and post-seminar readings and to complete assignments in their ministry contexts after they return home.
