

DM711: EXPLORING THE CONTOURS OF MINISTRY. (4 Units) Kurt Fredrickson, Assistant Professor of Pastoral Ministry and Director DMin Program, and John Hull, Adjunct Assistant Professor of Practical Theology

DESCRIPTION/RELEVANCE FOR MINISTRY:

This online course is the gateway into the Doctor of Ministry Program. This course should be taken immediately upon admission to the program and serves as a general orientation to the program and an introduction to the theological method and practices of the program. Students are invited to discover and share personal and ministry reflections within the context of a local community of support. This is a required first course for all students on the personalized track, unless approved otherwise.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Develop a new understanding of the mission of the church within culture
- Understand the structure of the Doctor of Ministry program
- Understand and practice the theological method utilized throughout the program
- Create a community-based opportunity for personal and ministry reflection
- Develop and practice spiritual disciplines through interaction with a community of support, and participation in a silent retreat
- Develop a learning path for the program, and begin to form a theme for the final project

COURSE FORMAT:

This course is accessed online with four modules (The Fuller DMin program, A Theology of Ministry, Personal and Ministry Reflections, and Integration). The class will be conducted on the Internet using an 8-week lesson program with final work due in the eleventh (exam) week in accordance with Fuller's academic calendar. The course consists of required texts and written lectures, interaction with a local community of support, and other assignments.

- Write a theologically reflective integration paper (15 pages) that includes a learning path for the program (25%)
- Participate in a silent retreat (5%).

RELATIONSHIP TO CURRICULUM: This is a required first course for entry to the DMin program.
